

AN ECONOMICAL TWIN



Friday mornings at Airport Manatee often attract rare and unusual aircraft. Dave Thompson arrived in his Aeroprakt A26 Vulcan that he has owned for over twenty years. The A-26 is a light twin-engine aircraft developed from a modified A-20 single-engine aircraft. Dual Rotax 582 64 hp engines with three-blade composite props push the A-26 into the air in less than 100 feet. It can land in 350 feet and climbs out at 1800 feet per minute. It can pass a Cessna 172 in cruise.

Initially based in Kyiv, Ukraine, Aeroprakt Aircraft now operates out of Poland with distributors around the world. Their flagship aircraft are the Aeroprakt 32 Vixxen and 22LS. Both are high-wing tricycle gear tractor aircraft. The US distributor is Heavenbound Aviation in Johnstown, Ohio.

I bought the first A-20 to arrive in the States from the Ukraine from John Hunter, Spectrum Aviation, in Sebring after it had served for several years as a demonstrator. A real performer, of all the aircraft I have owned, I rank it in the top two I would like to have back.

THE \$100 TACO





