Cleanup following Hurricane Milton is finally underway at Manatee Airport (48X). Crews have been tearing down what is left of a dozen or so destroyed hangars and hauling away the skeletal remains and piles of metal. The fact that so many hangars were lost is possibly due to three things. One, the trees that once surrounded the airport and provided some shelter from surface winds were cleared. That left acres of barren farm fields giving winds a straight-line shot at the hangars. Two, the hangars were initially installed as "temporary" structures and therefore had very shallow footings. Many were wrenched from the ground. And, third, years of ocean air has eaten away at the steel frames, rusting the pipe trusses completely through, compromising the structural integrity.

What the future contains for the remaining

hangars or any possibility of new hangars remains unclear as does the future of the airport itself. The once shiny new hangars with canvas roofs provided shelter for many years and became even more permanent when the canvas was exchanged for corrugated aluminum. No doubt there will be questions raised about the fate of the remaining aging hangars and their ability to protect their valuable contents in the next big blow.

We all hope for the best and desire to preserve the uniqueness of Manatee Airport. There are few like it left.
